




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"Quality Is Better Than Quantity"



LESSON LEARNED




About two years ago I was on a familiar road with a lot of curves and was approaching an almost 90 degree curve to the left. I saw some leaves on the curve ahead and decided to slow, even though I knew the leaves were dry. Good decision. At the apex of the curve, I felt a sharp whack and the bike started skittering to the right toward the side of the road. The lean angle had increased to the point that I was about to go down on my left side. I was able to get it back upright, but that meant that I was no longer turning with the curve, but was still headed for the side of the road, but in an upright position this time. I immediately leaned it over to the floorboards on the left side and kept it on the road. All of this takes a while to tell, but the actual elapsed time was probably less than two seconds.

When I got to a safe spot I looked at my front tire and found a scuff mark about the size of a golf ball on the left sidewall. A few days later I saw loose rock in the curve that had come from an intersecting driveway. The rocks had been camouflaged by the leaves and not noticeable on the approach. Had I been going a few miles an hour faster, or had the rock been a little larger, the outcome may not have been as favorable.

Now when I approach a curve with leaves, I approach with the idea that objects may well be concealed by the leaves and adjust my speed accordingly.

As a former military pilot, one thing I remember most is the adage that pilots must learn from the mistakes of others, as no pilot will live long enough to make all the mistakes himself. That is, sooner or later, something he didn't learn from others will be his undoing. This is especially apropos to our sport. Lesson learned.
