heading out this spring. Your tires will have lost pressure sitting in the garage this winter. How's your tread wear? If you have any doubt as to the readiness of


months. It is always good to review safe group riding procedures and start out slow as you get reacquainted with your bike.

Head Road Captain Report, "Colonel" Tony Cornelius

Muletown, In this issue I want to focus on defensive motorcycle riding. I have to admit over the years (especially my younger years) I did some pretty stupid stuff on a bike both on and off road, and I'm betting like most of you, I still love to accelerate hard and speed down the open road. At some point in our lives though, we begin to understand that we are not indestructible and that our safety isn't always in our own hands...

I'm guessing that most of you are past this point, but it's still important for us to revisit and discuss ways to protect ourselves and our family while we are doing something that brings us so much enjoyment. We are truly our brother's keeper and while we are not always in control of other riders and motorists, we can help control our fate!

Here is some Slightly-dated but still valuable information from DefensiveDriving.com's Defensive Driving Course:

Knowing when collisions involving motorcycles are most likely to occur can help you ride safely in dangerous situations:
Left Turns – Nationally, the most

common crash between cars and motorcycles is at an intersection when the automobile driver is making a left turn in front of a motorcycle. In 2008, there were 2,554 two-vehicle fatal crashes involving a motorcycle and another type of vehicle.

SLOW DOWN AT BUSY INTERSECTIONS AND BE PREPARED!

Blind Spots – Motorcycles riding alongside a lane of cars are often out of view of the driver. An unsuspecting driver may collide with a motorcycle as the driver tries to change lanes.

DON'T SIT IN A BLINDSPOT – STAY VISIBLE TO OTHERS!

Hazardous Road Conditions – Motorcycles have to be very concerned about road obstructions such as potholes and fallen tree limbs. Railroad tracks may be a minor problem for drivers, but a motorcyclist may have to slow down or change lanes to avoid these obstacles.

KEEP YOUR EYES ON THE ROAD AND SCAN! DON'T BECOME DISTRACTED!

Weather Conditions – When the road surface is wet or icy,

motorcycle braking and handling abilities are impaired.

SLOW DOWN – THE CONTACT PATCH BETWEEN YOU AND THE ROAD IS SMALL TO BEGIN WITH!

Strong Winds – A strong gust of wind can move a motorcycle across an entire lane if the rider isn't prepared for it. Wind gusts from large trucks passing in the other lane can be a real hazard.

BE PREPARED – STAY UP ON THE HANDLE BARS WITH FEET ON FLOORBOARDS.


Large Vehicles – A large vehicle such as a van, bus, or truck can block a motorcycle from a driver's view. The motorcycle may seem to suddenly appear out of nowhere.

LEAVE EXTRA SPACE BETWEEN YOURSELF AND LARGE VEHICLES – STAY VISIBLE!

The friends/colleagues I have lost through the years on motorcycles have always involved excessive speed (or exceeding safe speed for the conditions) and/or high blood alcohol content.

Please be safe (and defensive) out there. Rumble On!
