Assistant Director's Report, Eddie Fisher

As I write this article the State Rally is in full swing. We have a number of our members representing the chapter in this motorcycle gathering on the Cumberland Plateau in Cookeville, TN. The rally committee did a great job of putting together good music, activities, and rides that really represent what HOG is all about.

In this quarter's article, I wanted to touch a little bit on safety. I read an article in this month's American Iron Magazine that had some good food for thought about crashes involving another vehicle as

well as accidents with only the bike involved. We tend to think that most of the accidents involving motorcycles happen at intersections because the other guy didn't see the bike. While this type of accident is certainly true, the article goes on to state that nearly half of all motorcycle crashes are single vehicle, which means that the rider of the bike was at fault for one reason or another.

Many motorcyclists including myself have always said that you have to ride like your invisible to avoid accidents. This is a good start, but make sure you always think about your strategies

for avoiding a collision with a car. Ask yourself, which direction is my out if that car turns in front of me in an intersection? Think about if you are in a blind spot while traveling down a multi-lane road where the vehicle in the next lane can't see you. He may cross over on top of you into your lane. Another area when we are in a hurry; Am I following too close to the car in front of me? This would make it almost impossible to maneuver around that retread "gator" which suddenly popped out from underneath the car.

Hmmmn? Guess I better watch that. And the rest of you guys better watch those leans in the turns.



Just got back Saturday from my first HOG Rally – what a great experience! I had been trying to think of what I was going to write for the newsletter so I was hoping to get inspired while I was in Cookeville.

On Friday morning we went to stage for a group ride to the bike drag racing event at the nearby drag way in Buffalo Valley. I was shocked when I came around the corner and saw what had to have been nearly a hundred bikes already waiting and many more coming in behind. The motorcycle police escort must have numbered ten alone. When they called for the safety briefing I was ready to hear the most detailed account of group riding safety that I had ever heard, then it came, "ride to your own limits and pull off and wait for the sweep if you're not comfortable. We'll be heading out in about five minutes." What? That's it? I was thinking to myself that this is going to

be a catastrophe! Turned out to be my inspiration for my article and... Guess what – also turns out that we all do things the same way when riding in a group and the ride went perfectly!

In the military we call this standard operating procedure or SOP. This practice allows us to ride together in Muletown or with any other HOG group in a safe and fun way. It's so very important that we understand our own riding "SOP" aka "the Group Riding Handbook" which can be found on the chapter's website so that we know the person in front of us or behind us is going to react the same way in any given situation whether they are from our chapter or another.

The other thing we need to do (most importantly in my opinion) is practice riding in a group environment. It's everyone's individual responsibility to stay familiar with the "SOP". Please take some time to review it if you haven't for a while. If you are

new to group riding, please download a copy, learn it, and ask as many questions as you need until you feel comfortable riding in the group.

Most of all – ride on as many group rides as possible, especially when you are first starting out. Now, did I think the safety briefing I mentioned earlier could have been a little more detailed? Probably, but in the end it was each and every rider that already heard their local road captains briefings dozens of times and had been on multiple group rides that knew what needed to be done – and did it professionally!

I'm looking forward to seeing you all on the rides this season. Come on out and keep in practice with a small group so you're ready for the big group ride when the time comes!
