Recently I was reading an article by Fred Rau, a regular contributor to Motorcycle Consumer News, entitled "Motorcycle Unfriendly". The article addressed highway issues that impact motorcycle safety. As I read the article I was surprised at how many of the issues Mr. Rau addressed were present in abundance in our own riding "neighborhood". I know we have great roads in Tennessee in comparison to many other states but when it comes to motorcycle safety Tennessee still has a way to go. Here are some of the issues that we see regularly in our riding:

- Rain groves cut into the pavement to provide better traction for four wheelers in wet weather can create significant control issues for motorcycles. Can you say Nashville's 440 inter loop? Significant portions of the 440 loop have rain groves that will make even your 4 wheeler squirm.
- "Tar Snakes" or silicon compounds used to seal cracks in the road can be as slippery as ice. Until Hwy 412 was recently paved it was full of "Tar Snakes.
- Vinyl traffic arrows and lane markers used in place of paint can cause a serious reduction in traction
- Steel plates used to cover holes. Our own Harley Davidson Blvd. has a couple of steel plates, and when wet I guarantee you they are slick.
- Rumble strips that let a driver know they are wandering off the road. What about Carter's Creek Pike, not only does it have rumble strips on the side but there are rumble strips on the center line as well.
- Off camber turns can cause problems. Have you ever been surprised by scraping your floor board when making a right hand turn from the Tom Hitch By-pass onto Bear Creek Pike?

Even though we have great roads there are gremlins out there that can bite you if you don't stay alert. Keep your head and eyes up and ride safely.



Well here it is October and the fall riding has been great so far! Long sleeve shirt maybe your leather and your off and running. The membership stands at 60, and I have seen a few members who I haven't seen for a while, and told them about the picnic and what a good time they missed. I also told them just because they haven't made a lot of rides please try to attend the special ones: picnic, turkey run, Christmas party etc. It's always great to shoot the breeze with all our members. The "Bucket" List

We all have one. That list of things we want to do and places we want to go, mine just has Volumes 1 & 2. Not that I haven't been working on checking them off. It's just that I seem to be adding more as I go along. This past summer was no exception. We were heading to Alaska with our list in hand and looking forward to putting those checkmarks down the side as we traveled along.

We had months to plan and prepare but as the time drew near the excitement was almost unbearable. We thought we had planned for just about anything, but it was "Mr. Murphy" who said it best, "Anything that can go wrong, will." That's another story for another time, for this I'm going to focus on some of the good parts.

We left the first week of June and our travels took us northwest through South Dakota to Montana. Anybody who has been there will back me up; this is truly some beautiful country. Plenty of things to see and do there but those were all things checked off from previous trips. When you leave Rapid City and travel through Wyoming the Rocky Mountains start to appear on the horizon. There were plenty of times when the view framed by the windshield was just spectacular. When we got to Butte, Montana we turned north with the excitement of crossing into Canada not far off. This was uncharted territory for us; we had never been further west than Bozeman so it was all "new" to us from there on. Crossing in to Canada was painless for the most part, but I needed to practice some of my answers before we crossed back so as not to be pulled aside for the complete inspection. I really didn't know how long we planned on being in Canada and that answer just wasn't

good enough for the border patrol agent. I'm sure the case of Bud Light was another strike against me too. I just never acquired a taste for Canadian beer, sorry. As it turned out, I would have liked to spend a lot more time there than we did, so my "list" has a few new entries for another trip another day.

After we made our way through Calgary we headed out to Ice Fields Parkway into Banff and Jasper National parks. This is where we saw our first glacier. The Columbia Glacier was just off the parkway, and worth the trip. Hearing there were record-breaking temps back home, it didn't feel nearly as cold as it was. From there we worked our way up to Dawson Creek, Milepost "O" of the Alaskan Highway. If you ever entertain the notion of making this trip, invest in a Milepost book to guide you along. It is filled with information and well worth the cost. As we drove along and counted down the miles, the scenery changed from mountains and forests to permafrost tundra. Each having a



beauty all their own, but it was there that you <u>really</u> learn the meaning of rough road. This is also where you begin to see signs that inform travelers that services ahead are available from May through October. They don't just roll up the sidewalks at 5; they shut down the whole town, pack up and leave. Still we kept heading northwest knowing that our destination was not too far off now.

The first city you come to in Alaska is a place called Tok. That is where Darlene saw her first log cabin with a sod roof, I don't know if it was that or the push mower left up there that she liked most. This is where we saw our first sled dog kennel and noticed all the vehicles have cords hanging from the front bumper. My brother told me that there are 3 different heaters installed under their hoods so vehicles will start in the cold temps.

From Tok we headed out toward Anchorage down Highway 1. There are only 3 paved main roads in Alaska two of which begin or end at Tok. They make a loop from there to Anchorage or Fairbanks and back. No getting lost in Alaska. Take the 1 to the 2 to the 3 which takes you back where you started. As we made our way down Hwy 1 we made a side trip to Valdez. It's a beautiful town on the coast surrounded by mountains and the trip getting there was spectacular in itself. Glaciers, waterfalls and even eagles became a common sight around every corner. While we were there we enjoyed watching the fishing charters come in with their catch of the day and it was



there I saw my first sea otter and was amazed at their size.

Leaving Valdez we made our way to Anchorage and then down to Seward. While visiting Seward, we took a Glacier sightseeing cruise. It was a beautiful day. As we left the harbor area, everyone was treated to a show from sea otters, porpoises, sea lions, whales and a variety of other sea life. As we made our way up the Kenai Fjord toward our first tidal glacier the scenery was amazing. When we made it to the bay area, the glacier was entering the water. Our captain stopped the boat, killed the motor and we just floated, while we watched and listened. I couldn't believe the sound. It's like thunder as the glacier cracks while moving slowly down the valley and into the water. It started, as a little puff of snow and ice but before long a large chunk would fall splashing into the bay. Some chunks large enough to make waves that would rock the boat.

Leaving Seward, we headed north toward Fairbanks. We stopped along the way and spent time in Denali National Park. We actually got to see Mt. McKinley; it's usually covered by clouds. During our time in Fairbanks, we were able to get up close and touch the Alaskan Pipeline. We had seen the pipeline snake its way through the countryside as we traveled and watched the video of the construction so I had to get a close look for myself.

After a little family time with my brother and his family we left Fairbanks and traveled down to Delta Junction which is Mile marker 1422, the official end of the Alaskan Highway.

It was there that I put the checkmark next to: <u>Drive the Alaskan Highway</u>. It sounds like such a little thing when I say that, but it was so much more. There are so many things that just

have to be seen or experienced before you can truly appreciate them. That is my reason for having the <u>Bucket List</u>. That drive is definitely one of them. It was a once in a lifetime trip that I am so glad I was able to make.

So as we headed home and make those checkmarks along the way I hope that each of you never makes it to the end of your Bucket List as I know I never will. Remember it is never about the Destination but the Journey!
